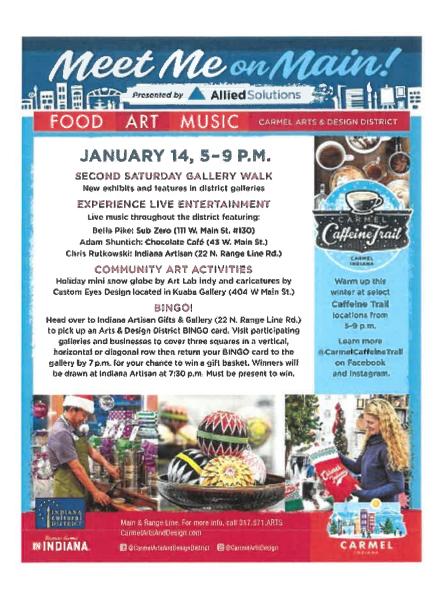

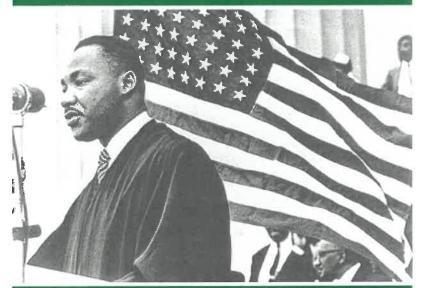

arly in his career, Dr. Siva a place where pets could get veterinary care for sudden illnesses or injuries without going to an emergency hospital.

After all, pet owners can't predict when their furry companions might require medical care, but traditional vet offices can't always see animals without an appointment.

Now Nalabotu is working to fill the gap with VetCheck Pet Urgent Care Centers—a local practice with enormous aspirations.

Road) in 2021. The company is now using a franchise model in an effort to go nationwide.

In 2023, VetCheck franchisees plan to open single locations in Bloomington (4863 W. Richland Plaza); suburban Dallas; and York, Pennsylvania. Multiple locations are scheduled to open this year in the Atlanta, Nashville and Pittsburgh metropolitan areas.

Another 30 VetCheck franchises are in early-stage development. And the company is working to raise \$100 million in from investors to fund the opening of what it hopes will be 250 urgent care centers

Proposal could ax tax for thousands

But legislation would reduce local revenue

A House lawmaker is reviving an effort to make changes to the business personal property tax that would offer a bit of a windfall to small-business owners while reducing local government revenue.

Rep. Peggy Mayfield, R-Martinsville, is filing legislation that would raise the exemption that determines which companies must pay the business personal property tax. Her bill would exempt all

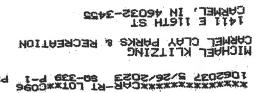
companies that own machinery, equipment and other tangible goods that cost them, in total, less than \$250,000. The current threshold is \$80,000.

The proposed change could essentially eliminate as many as 48,000 tax returns, according to past legislative estimates.

Mayfield's bill is the latest in a series of efforts over decades to reduce the personal property tax on businesses and simplify its administrative accounting headaches. The concept has the support of House Speaker Todd Huston. But its chances of passage are less clear in the Senate, where leading Republicans are

Global-health group aims for new med school

Tumaini Foundation begins pursuit of Indiana vision

It has no employees, no higher-education accreditation and only about \$40,000 in the bank.

But a group of physicians and business leaders, many with ties to DePauw University in Greencastle, is quietly drawing up plans to establish a medical school in Indiana with a focus on global health.

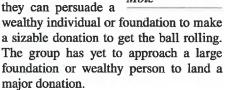
The not-for-profit Tumaini Foundation for Global Health and Humanitarianism says it wants to train medical students with a special concern for the health of needy individuals and populations worldwide. That includes rural and inner-city areas in Indiana as well as impoverished, developing nations.

"Indiana needs more physicians, particularly physicians that would be inclined to practice in low-resource settings," said Dr. Thomas Mote, a semi-retired anesthesiologist who is president of the Tumaini board.

The Indianapolis-based group has not made an official announcement about

where it plans to set up a school or how it plans to raise tens of millions of dollars.

But in several discussions with IBJ in recent weeks, the organization's leaders say the need is huge, and they hope



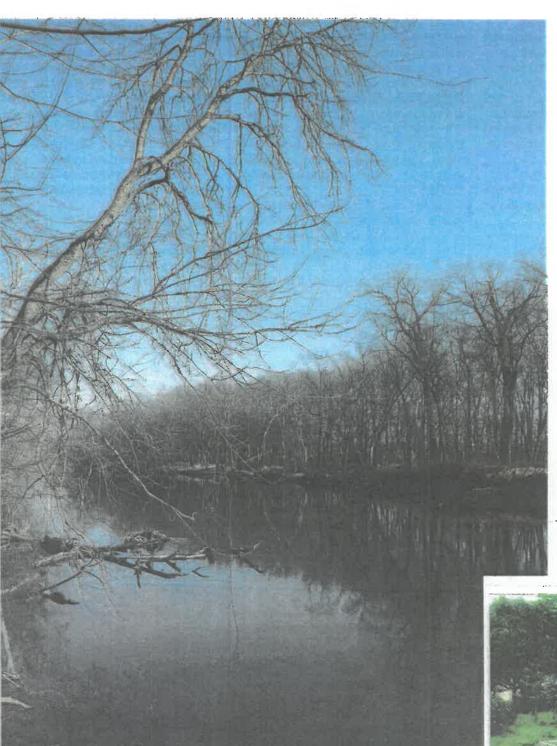

"It's not a goal that we just think of as being in the clouds," said Kathleen Jagger, president of Newman University, a private, Catholic college in Wichita, Kansas, and a Tumaini board member. "... The big challenge right now is selling the idea, helping people understand [that] the way we traditionally think about medicine in the U.S. has some limitations."

The group's twofold mission is to make health care accessible to all and to help alleviate disparities, often in low-income communities, that lead to lower life expectancy and higher rates of disease.

Growing a happy trail

Carmel set to expand White River Greenway

armel will begin work this summer or fall to extend a trail network along the White River as part of a \$4 million project city officials say is more than 30 years in the making.

The White River Greenway will wind and curve near the river for 5.4 miles from East 116th Street to East 146th Street once it is completed next year.

That will make the trail about a half-mile longer than the Monon Greenway, which runs from East 96th Street to East 146th Street and is Carmel's section of the 27-mile Monon Trail.

"What's exciting about the White River Greenway is that it's going to be more nature-focused and provide that place for people to breathe fresh air and experience the trees and the wildlife that you'll see along the trail," Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation Director Michael Klitzing told IBJ.

The most extensive work will take place from Tall Timber Run, where the current 2-1/2-mile trail now ends, north to East 146th Street. A trailhead is planned near the intersection of River Road

and Haverton Way. It will include an overlook, a bike repair station, parking, restrooms and benches.

"We're envisioning something that's somewhat artistic," Klitzing said. "We're looking at something that is really kind of scenic, and envision [it] as a space where people will not only come to see the river

but [also as] a popular spot for senior photos and wedding photos and family photos."

The trailhead will have Wi-Fi service, and Klitzing expects people to use it as a place to get internet work done outside.

Much of the northern section of the White River Greenway will be on property owned by Conner Prairie, which will grant an easement to Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation to construct the trail extension.

Klitzing said the parks department is working closely with Conner Prairie.

"We'll be doing all the construction, but it will also take into account [Conner Prairie's] future plans for expansion of their campus onto the west side of the White River into Carmel," Klitzing said.

Last August, Conner Prairie announced plans for \$24 million in capital projects that include a 260-acre expansion across the river.

A new section of the White River Greenway on its southern end will connect it to an existing perimeter trail at River Heritage Park near East 122nd Street. Carmel opened a trail network at the park last year.

"Having that trail along the river is a neat thing," Mayor Jim Brainard said. "It'll be good for property values. It'll be good for the quality of life of the people who live in Carmel. And it'll be good for tourism."

Long time coming

The city has looked at ways to build out the White River Greenway since 1991, the year Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation was established.

One of the top five original goals of the parks department was to embrace the White River, which hugs Carmel's eastern border with Fishers. Creating a trail network along or near the river was always planned as a key way to accomplish that, Klitzing said.

It's only been in the past couple of years, however, that work began in earnest to make the trail a reality as the parks department coordinated with Conner Prairie.

Klitzing said the timing was right as Conner Prairie's leaders began crafting plans for the museum's westward expansion across the river. The parks department and the museum also plan to collaborate on creating a facility near the trail called the White River Ecology Center that will focus on telling the river's story.

The White River Greenway is "something that we've been striving to do for over 30 years," Klitzing said. "Obviously, the attention for the current [trail] has been a little bit more focused over the last couple of years in conjunction with the White River Vision Plan that was developed with Hamilton County and Marion [County], Indianapolis and the communities within the respective counties."

Unveiled in June 2019, the White River Vision Plan aims to make better use of the 58-mile stretch of the White River that runs through Hamilton and Marion counties. Trail expansion and enhanced connectivity have been recommended for the Allisonville Road stretch of the plan, which includes the White River Greenway.

Brainard pointed to the river as one of central Indiana's few natural amenities. He said one of his goals as mayor has been to preserve as much green space along the river as possible.

The region's flat terrain lends itself to biking, which is a major draw on Carmel's 245 miles of trails.

"That's an asset Indianapolis and the region, I think, have done very well leveraging," Brainard said. "We don't have mountains or oceans, but what do we have? Flat land for bike trails. A lot of people have moved to Carmel, they've told me, from other parts of the region because they like to bike, and everything's pretty much connected at this point."

Both Brainard and Klitzing said Carmel saw a rapid increase in usage of its parks and trails when the pandemic began in 2020, as people looked to get outside.

"It's part of our civic wealth to have these places where everybody feels some ownership, where they can meet people who have different life experiences than they do, and that's an often-overlooked part of why parks are important," Brainard said.

Regional spirit

Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation will use \$4 million in funding the city received through the Regional Economic Acceleration and Development Initiative, a grant program aimed at helping communities generate growth and attract business.

In December 2021, the Indiana Economic Development Corp. board and Gov. Eric Holcomb used \$500 million to provide READI funding to 17 regions around Indiana.

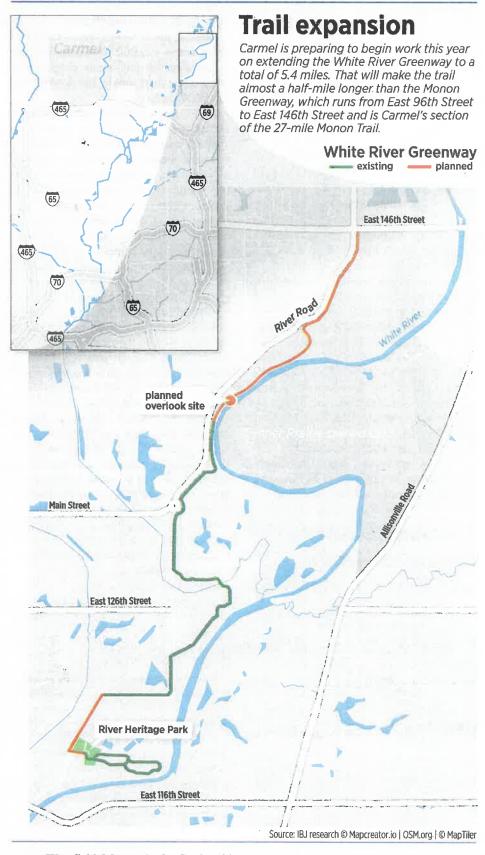
The White River region—consisting of Marion, Hamilton and Madison counties—was one of three central Indiana regions to receive a \$20 million grant.

"Part of the goal for this trail, obviously, is enhancing quality of life, which is one of the goals of the READI program, and also to help spark the development that Conner Prairie envisions for the west-side expansion," Klitzing said.

The regional spirit of the READI program could also play a role in expanding the White River Greenway into Fishers and Noblesville.

While no concrete plans or funding are currently in place for that further expansion, such a project is just what regional leaders had in mind when they formed the Central Indiana Redevelopment Authority.

Anderson, Beech Grove, Carmel, Fishers, Indianapolis, Lawrence, McCordsville, Noblesville, Speedway and Zionsville constitute the RDA. Westfield's city council last fall declined to vote on an ordinance to join the alliance, over concerns about potential future



costs. Westfield Mayor Andy Cook told IBJ he does not think the council will approve the city's entry into the RDA.

Klitzing said the Central Indiana RDA was largely inspired by the White River Vision Plan, which means the river will be a major focus for grant recipients.

Those projects in many cases will involve quality-of-life amenities, such as the White River Greenway, that make the region more attractive to people and businesses looking to move here, he added.

"Ultimately, we envision a White River Greenway either close to or adjacent to the river that goes through all of our respective communities to some degree, so hopefully it will be connecting into the trail networks in Noblesville and through perimeter trails that already exist along 146th Street," Klitzing said. "It'll provide connectivity across the 146th Street bridge, which the county is improving to enter Fishers, Noblesville—that direction

A plan suggested three years ago to extend the greenway across the river at East 126th Street into Fishers was determined to be cost-prohibitive due to topographical challenges on the Fishers side of the river.

However, Klitzing said Carmel is working with Fishers, Delaware Township, Clay Township and Conner Prairie to find other locations for trail connectivity across the river between Carmel and Fishers.

"We don't have definitive plans for that," Klitzing said, "but that's still a goal of ours that we hope to accomplish sooner than later."

The collection of city parks in Hamilton County, along with Conner Prairie, and the potential for increased connectivity through a trail network "creates a variety of different amenities and recreational experiences or educational experiences that almost has the feel of a state park," he added.

- Brainard pointed to the possibility of a future pedestrian bridge along East 106th Street that could connect to trails at Carmel's Hazel Landing Park and Fishers' Heritage Park.

"It'd be the perfect place to make a connection," he said. "There are parks on both sides of the river."



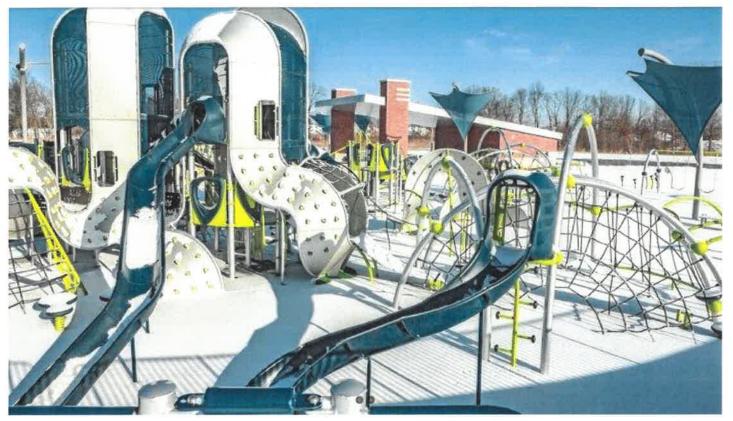

STRATEGIC ACTION PLAN — IMPLEMENTATION STATUS REPORT

Based on community feedback, stakeholder input, technical analysis, and the priority rankings outlined within this Master Plan, the following key recommendations were developed to enhance the park and recreation system and position it to best serve the current and future needs of the community.

1.1 KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1.1 ENHANCE PARK AND RECREATION OPPORTUNITIES WITHIN THE COMMUNITY:

- Expand trails, river access, and environmental education along the White River Regional Corridor
 - Complete a regional river corridor site plan
 - 2020 Continued participation by Executive Director in White River Vision Plan, which will include expansion of White River Greenway.
 - 2021 The White River Regional Opportunity Initiative (WR-ROI) Partnership was created to prepare a Regional Development Plan to submit for a Regional Economic Acceleration + Development Initiative (READI) grant through the Indiana Economic Development Commission (IEDC). The WR-ROI is inspired by the White River Vision Plan, which details a cohesive regional vision, goals, projects, and programs related to economic development within the White River Region.
 - Ensure cohesion with the White River Vision Plan/Identify partners on both sides of the River
 - 2020 Continued discussions with Conner Prairie for expansion of the White River Greenway from current northern terminus of trail to 146th Street.
 - 2020 Entered into an agreement with Clay Township for development of a pedestrian bridge across the White River Greenway as part of the Clay Township Impact Program. This project will ultimately connect the Carmel and Fishers trail networks in involves collaboration between CCPR, Clay Township, City of Carmel, Conner Prairie, Hamilton County Parks & Recreation, and the City of Fishers.
 - 2021 The WR-ROI Partnership, Central Indiana Regional Development Authority within the IndyMPO, consists of three counties: Hamilton, Madison, and Marion; and eight communities: Anderson, Carmel, Fishers, Indianapolis, McCordsville, Noblesville, Westfield, and Zionsville.
 - Develop a dedicated funding strategy for development of the corridor
 - 2021 The Hamilton County South River District/Conner Prairie Westside Expansion was selected as one of the signature projects for WR-ROI. This potentially positions the White River Education and Ecology Center to receive up to \$7.3 million if WR-ROI is successful in securing READI grant. Hamilton County also committed up to \$1 million for the ecology center if the project receives funds through READI grant.
 - 2021 Submitted Next Level Trails grant application to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources
 in hopes of securing state funding for the development of the north extension of the trailhead.
 - 2022 Department awarded \$4 million READI grant from WR-ROI; Funding to be used for development
 of the north extension of the White River Greenway, including new trailhead and river outlook on
 Matilda Haverstick property.
 - 2023 Department awarded \$1 million from Hamilton County, Indiana for improvements along the White River Corridor, specifically the Hamilton County South River District.
 - Develop view sheds along trails for users to enjoy the White River and include picnic areas
 - 2020 At end of 2019, CCPR secured approximately 13.55 acres of property along Hazel Dell Parkway which will serve as a future trailhead along the White River Corridor; homestead on the property was demolished in 2020 and has been restored to a natural state.
 - 2020 Focus of River Heritage Park development will be accessible trails and view sheds along the White River.

- 2021 Approved professional services agreement with SJCA for the White River Greenway North
 Extension design development plans. Began working on design concepts for trail overlooks and the
 anticipated trailhead on CCPR property.
- 2021 Wellheads at Thomas Marcuccilli Nature Park will receive improvements (funded by Carmel Utilities), which will allow them to serve as Overlooks
- 2021 Completed an invasive species assessment of CCPR and Conner Prairie property from the
 current terminus of the White River Greenway to the proposed location of the White River Education
 and Ecology Center. This data will help identity the best route for the White River Greenway extension.
- 2022 Completed improvements at River Heritage Park which include two new river overlooks with seating for the public.

Elevate the brand of all trails throughout the City through enhanced marketing strategies

- 2020 As new parks and upgrades to existing parks are being made, CCPR diligently works to educate public on amenities available and how changes positively impact the community via website and social media platforms.
- 2021 Improved CCPR website to ensure public can easily navigate park projects and obtain critical information.

Work with the City of Carmel to make trail connectivity a priority (10-minute walk to a park)

- 2020 Flowing Well Park added two additional access points for foot traffic into park, one from 116th St. and one from Gray Road
- 2020 Added restrooms to Carey Grove and Flowing Well Parks which will significantly increases the
 amount of time a patron can spend in the park, also increasing the viability of visitors to walk to the
 park (don't have to drive in case someone has to use the restroom)
- 2020 Township approved new pedestrian bridge over White River which will connect City of Carmel and Fishers
- 2021 CCPR met with representatives to review design concepts of future White River pedestrian bridge that will be funded/constructed using the Clay Township Impact Program.
- 2021 Kite Realty Group, Buckingham Properties, and the Carmel Redevelopment Commission development "The Corner" requests an easement for a trail connection between an apartment building being constructed as part of the project and the Interurban Trail.

O Develop loop trails to tie into existing neighborhood parks

- 2021 CCPR engaged in discussions with Albany Village, the new subdivision to be constructed on the east side of Shelborne Road across from Bear Creek Park regarding the potential donation of approximately 9 acres with a developed multipurpose trail and native prairie installed by the developer that could serve as part of a larger Bear Creek Greenway.
- 2022 Initial planning for White River Greenway northern extension. Connectivity with TMNP, Conner Prairie, and 146th Street are priorities for the expansion.
- 2022 New wayfinding signs installed to illustrate Monon Greenway connectivity with Meadowlark Park and City CAB trail system
- 2022 Initial planning for western expansion of 116th pathway at West Park

Explore opportunities for trail amenities (watercraft access, off-trail fitness, overlook areas, etc.)

- 2020 Focus of River Heritage Park development will be accessible trails, view sheds and overlook areas along the White River.
- 2020 Added shuffleboards, spray plaza, table tennis, bocce ball, seating and shade areas along the Monon Greenway from Elm Street to Walnut Street.
- 2021 Completed improvements at Carey Grove Park which included fitness equipment around the perimeter of the playground.

- 2021 Approved professional services agreement with SJCA for the White River Greenway North Extension design development plans. Began working on design concepts for trail overlooks and the anticipated trailhead on CCPR property.
- 2022 Completed improvements at River Heritage Park which include two new river overlooks with seating for the public.
- Facilitate implementation of a West Regional Corridor centered on West Park
 - Ocomplete evaluation of the need for additional indoor recreation space at West Park
 - O Design/construct amenities to make West Park a Regional Destination Park
 - 2020 Construction started and anticipated to finish in the Fall of 2021.
 - 2021 Work continued in 2021, good progress made on connector road and culvert/bridge between the Core and the Groves, parking lot expansion, and splash pad. While park was originally planned to be complete in the Fall of 2021, a bevy of issues resulted in CCPR delaying the anticipated re-opening to Spring of 2022.
 - 2022 Park re-opened to the general public in the fall; several items are still outstanding and will be remedied in 2023 including pedestrian bridge rails, safety fencing, and startup of splashpad.
 - Establish a west-side steering committee to assist with partnership opportunities for land acquisition
 - 2020 Purchased approximately 26.91 acres, now known as Bear Creek Park, at 14330 Shelborne Road, Carmel, Indiana, fulfilling the goal of acquiring much needed new parkland in northwest Carmel as established in both the 2020-2024 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan and 2020-2025 Zone Improvement Plan.
 - Explore partnership opportunities that can assist with completing park development
 - Acquire and develop a community or neighborhood park in the northwest corner of Carmel
 - 2020 Purchased approximately 26.91 acres, now known as Bear Creek Park, at 14330 Shelborne Road, Carmel, Indiana, fulfilling the goal of acquiring much needed new parkland in northwest Carmel as established in both the 2020-2024 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan and 2020-2025 Zone Improvement Plan.
 - 2020 CCPR anticipates issuing requests for proposals in early-2021 to select a consultant to facilitate
 the preparation of a park master plan, which will guide the future development of the new park.
 - 2021 Demolition of existing homestead and structures at Bear Creek Park completed.
 - 2021 Engaged with SmithGroup to begin Master Plan process for Bear Creek Park.
 - 2021 Hosted focus group and community input meetings as part of Master Planning process for Bear Creek Park.
 - 2021 Bear Creek Park opened to public on weekends for limited pre-development use to help residents experience the park firsthand as part of the Master Plan process.
 - 2022 Bear Creek Park Master Plan adopted by the Carmel/Clay Board of Parks and Recreation on June 14th, 2022 via resolution G-2022-002.
- Develop a signature environmental education facility
 - Develop a feasibility study and business plan for a nature center
 - 2021 The Hamilton County South River District/Conner Prairie Westside Expansion was selected as one of the signature projects for WR-ROI. This potentially positions the White River Education and Ecology Center to receive up to \$7.3 million if WR-ROI is successful in securing READI grant. Hamilton County also committed up to \$1 million for the ecology center if the project receives funds through READI grant.
 - Seek partnerships to help develop and manage the program site if applicable
- Establish a neighborhood park strategy, recognizing the role of HOAs
 - O Coordinate with developers on new neighborhood park development per re-defined park classifications

- 2021 CCPR engaged in discussions with Albany Village, the new subdivision to be constructed on the east side of Shelborne Road across from Bear Creek Park regarding the potential donation of approximately 9 acres with a developed multipurpose trail and native prairie installed by the developer that could serve as part of a larger Bear Creek Greenway.
- Sign neighborhood parks accordingly
- Identify HOA properties and recreational amenities available
 - 2020 Work nearing completion on GIS capture of HOA properties which will help CCPR better
 understand community amenities available and its impact on future needs
 - 2021 Amenity report completed and is comprehensive beyond HOAs, including churches, schools, and multi-family complexes. Utilized breakdown of amenities within 1 mile radius of Bear Creek Park to highlight level of service within community during the Master Plan process.
- Seek innovative solutions to serve identified underserved or unserved populations
 - O Identify underserved or unserved populations in Carmel, Indiana and Clay Township
 - 2021 New culture-based program category added (replaced Creative Arts with Arts & Culture) to in hopes to educate community and better support growth of community
 - Evaluate the programs that are currently being provided to underserved or unserved populations by CCPR
 - 2021 Reimagining Recreation Plan evaluated the current resources CCPR has at its disposal post-COVID. Due to a reduction in staffing, four core program categories were identified that are underserved in the community. CCPR is now focused on growing these core program categories rather than trying to be many things for many people.
 - Evaluate and map the programs that are currently being provided for underserved or unserved populations by other local organizations
 - Develop individualized goals for CCPR programming staff to encourage the research, identification, planning, and execution of innovative programs geared towards the identified underserved or unserved populations
 - 2021 Community Outreach was a goal for our volunteer program to identify new groups for engagement. This included many new outlets and those listed in the next objective illustrate the underserved growth.
 - 2021 New Inclusion Supervisor hired in September with a broader background in inclusion and diversity. Goals established for creating programs geared around promoting diversity
 - 2021 Creative Arts category has been retitled Arts & Culture with the goal of creating more culturebased programs with an emphasis on cultural experiences and education
 - Utilize compiled data to formulate program offerings to meet the unmet needs of these populations throughout our Program Areas and Categories
 - 2021 Volunteer program partnership with Stratford Senior Living engaged our award-winning pollinator partnership program involving seed sorting from seeds collected by volunteers. Seed was transported to the retirement community to make the volunteer project easy for participation and in support of our CCPR mission and values.
 - 2021 Volunteer program engagement with Midwest Academy for a workday at Flowing Well Park where 39 volunteers gave 2.5 hours removing invasive burning bush, Japanese knotweed, trash, and dismantling 4 visitor created rock dams in Cool Creek. Midwest Academy is an intentional educational community serving students in grades 3-12 with ADD/ADHD, language-based learning differences, high functioning autism, and processing challenges. The school is designed to develop academic achievement, self-acceptance, and personal accountability.
 - 2021 Engaged in discussions with Janus Developmental Services, Inc. regarding workplace trainings and shadowing opportunities for individuals with disabilities.
 - Expand upon current successful partnerships to reach underserved or unserved populations

- 2020 Continued partnership with Carmel Marathon which allows Adaptive participants the ability to compete/participate in the annual Carmel 5K; Continued partnership with Carmel Health & Living Community to implement educational programs for seniors
- 2021 Department donated pieces of the former Meadowlark Park play structures to the Lake Lemon Conservancy District (LECD), helping the equipment find new life and avoid ending up in a landfill. By recycling it for LLCD's use the department also fulfilled a playground need for an underserved population.
- 2021 Partnership with Carmel Clay Public Library (CCPL) expanded due to construction at their main facility, and assisted with COVID-19 resources; Continued literacy development program partnership (Story Time Express and Story Walks)
- Create new partnerships with identified local organizations to fill current and future gaps in service for underserved or unserved populations
 - 2020 Texas Roadhouse: providing healthy dinners for Adaptive Participants, a priority for many individuals with developmental disabilities; Gordon Holmes/Tom Blessing/Mary Wallace: Educational programs for participants and their families ranging from financial planning to nutrition
 - 2021 Extended School Enrichment identified a local citizen to begin process of translating key
 documents in order to provide better customer service to the growing number of participants whose
 primary language is Spanish; long-term plan is to continue expanding to other languages
 - 2021 Implementation of UserWay accessibility widget to CCPR webpage to assist with visual impairments and language barriers.
 - 2021 Partnership with AAPR offering free tax preparation services to low-income households.
 - 2021 Partnership with Hamilton County Health Department, Hamilton County Emergency
 Management, and Carmel Fire Department to offer COVID-19 vaccination site to the community.
 - 2022 Partnership with Carmel Dad's Club, utilizing Fieldhouse for summer camp programs, able to expand camp type to additional participants.
- Continue to develop and evaluate internal reporting of populations served through CCPR programs and partnerships
 - 2020 Updated program survey which will allow for better capture of data from participants and better position CCPR to develop new programs and seek out additional partners
 - 2021 Volunteer program includes program evaluations by participants and records of each projects accomplishments
- Explore opportunities to provide community gardens as part of land-use strategies
 - 2021 Native food forest planted as part of a grant award that allowed for the planting of 100 native fruit and nut trees at Founders Park. Once the trees mature this stand of trees will provide a diverse range of native food sources for the community to pick and utilize in a sustainable fashion.

1.1.2 PROVIDE EXCEPTIONAL CUSTOMER EXPERIENCES:

- Reimagine existing parks through effective planning and appropriate updates
 - Update existing park master plans (Hazel Landing, Inlow, Carey Grove, Cherry Tree, Flowing Well, Meadowlark, and River Heritage)
 - 2020 The Clay Township Impact Program (CTIP) provided CCPR with funds to enhance and update Carey Grove, Flowing Well, West, Meadowlark, Inlow, and River Heritage Parks. Improvements will be made to the following amenities, which varies by park: playgrounds, splashpads, restrooms, bank stabilization, bridges, trails, parking lots, shelters, fishing piers, pickleball courts (new addition)
 - O Incorporate consistent design principles for all new parks and the update of existing parks
 - Develop a mini business plan for parks and facilities to ensure site will achieve outcomes desired

- Continue to upgrade playgrounds in existing parks
 - 2020 CTIP funds provided to CCPR will allow for playground/splashpad updates at Carey Grove, West, Meadowlark, River Heritage and Inlow Parks
 - 2021 Playground updates and park improvements completed at Carey Grove Park. West, Meadowlark, River Heritage and Inlow Park improvements underway and expected be completed in the Spring of 2022.
- Analyze community demographics to ensure park design meets needs of those it intends to serve
 - 2020 Community input meetings were held to obtain feedback on park improvements at Carey Grove, Flowing Well, and West Parks; Feedback incorporated into final park design
- Create nature preserve experiences throughout the park system
 - Seek a partnership with a not-for-profit to help preserve natural areas along the trails with resource plans
 - 2021 Adopt A Park program grew from 4 participants to 13 different participant groups ranging from private individuals, corporate businesses, local civic groups, and non-profits to help support long term preservation standards along trails and within park properties.
 - 2022 The Hamilton Invasives Partnership has grown into a significant resource for education and action to support preservation of natural areas throughout our properties and as well as serving all of Hamilton County. CCPR is a large contributor to multiple initiatives with this partnership including GIS mapping, Weed Wrangles, and volunteer training.
 - 2022 Pollinator Partnership group continues to be a huge resource in support of preservation of natural areas through the Project Wingspan initiative. CCPR supported the partnership with 9 total seed collection or seed sorting events to procure usable native wildflower seed for redistribution through the partnership.
 - Develop an interpretive plan for natural areas in the parks through updated interpretive signage
 - 2020 Interpretive signage added to Founders Park in Spring 2020 utilizing Rain on Main funds
 - 2020 Flowing Well interpretive signs are in final stages of production and will be installed in 2021 utilizing CTIP funds
 - 2021 Flowing Well signs were updated and installed as part of the CTIP project
 - 2020 Prairie Meadow signage will be implemented in 2021 utilizing Rain on Main funds
 - 2021 Prairie Meadow sign content is developed and awaiting final designs and production
 - 2020 Meadowlark Park interpretive signage was received as an add-alternate in bids received, evaluating to determine if CTIP funds will be sufficient to cover expense
 - 2021 Meadowlark Park interpretive signs content is developed and awaiting final designs and production
 - 2022 Meadowlark Park interpretive signs were installed all throughout the trail system of the park
 - 2022 Interactive interpretive signs at River Heritage are in design phase
 - Develop educational content that helps locate and identify key natural resources in CCPR specific parks
 - 2020 Park Conversations magazine, created in 2019, continues to provide the community with educational content pertinent to CCPR parks and natural resources
 - 2020 Volunteer Stewardship projects focused on targeted education on fostering sustainable habitats within CCPR properties
 - 2020 My Park Series which highlights key natural resources and history of CCPR specific parks was created in 2019. Plans to expand upon the program were delayed in 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic but will be re-initiated in 2021
 - 2020 Wildflower Walks will be expanded upon in 2021
 - 2020 Stewardship focused web presence in development with PNR/Marketing planned for Spring
 2021 rollout (educational components are a key focus of each stewardship park activity)

- 2021 Stewardship web pages were developed with formatting and added content for 1st gtr 2022 live rollout.
- 2021 Participant Learning Outcomes (PLO's) were documented as part of each stewardship engagement program and utilized as a baseline standard of information for participants to gain knowledge and understanding of the projects they are participating in and how they contribute to the larger mission, vision, and values of CCPR.
- 2022 PNR division took responsibility for CCPR Nature offerings to include fee-based programs. The
 control over curriculum development will provide greater connections with educational experiences
 that can focus on examples of park restoration projects or other internal stewardship activities.
- 2022 Nature Keepers program concepts for youth summer programs in 2023 has been a key focus
 for reinventing the CCPR summer nature program outline.
- 2022 PNR hired 1st part-time naturalist position to add another facilitator to our ranks to increase program delivery in 2023.
- 2022 PNR staff were invited to be guest presenters with Blatchley Nature Study Club presenting on the Pollinator Partnership
- 2022 14 free nature programs were delivered as stewardship program delivery continues to be a key component of the PNR Division.
- Seek National Audubon recognition for habitat and native plant preservation and integration of the park system
- Develop resource management plans for those parks that are preservation designated
 - 2020 Converted approximately 8 acres of turf/grass to native prairie at Steckley Property
 - 2021 Year 2 of strategic invasive species mitigation efforts with contracted support from Park Foundation dollars to focus on Vera Hinshaw Preserve sustainable habitat restoration efforts
 - 2021 2nd Annual World Habitat Day native tree and shrub planting project at Vera Hinshaw Preserve continuing phased approach to long term restoration efforts
 - 2021 Woodland Gardens native planting restoration project for Earth Day
 - 2022 Natural Resource Management Plan was updated to reflect changes in departmental strategies and priorities from the original 2011 version. Preserve property specific plans will be added in 2023.
 - 2022 3rd Annual World Habitat Day native tree and shrub planting project at Vera Hinshaw Preserve
 continued phased approach to long term restoration efforts.
 - 2022 94.7% survival rate for woody trees and shrubs with Flowing Well restoration and enhancement to support mitigation of disturbed areas from bank stabilization project
- Provide a diverse selection of facilities and amenities to accommodate indoor and outdoor recreational pursuits
 - Consider developing more health-related amenities in parks (loop trails, art, cultural, outdoor fitness equipment)
 - 2020 Outdoor cardio equipment was incorporated into park design at Carey Grove Park
 - 2021 Completed City Center mural project in partnership with Carmel High School (CHS) and the City
 of Carmel; designed by Caroline Hammonds, a student at CHS
 - 2021 Clay Township and the City of Carmel began improvements to the existing Japanese Garden honoring Carmel's sister city of Kawachinagano, Osaka, Japan. CCPR will assume maintenance responsibilities for the expanded park upon completion
 - 2021 6 pickleball courts were incorporated into construction plans for 2 park sites Meadowlark and Lawrence Inlow Parks — to be completed in 2022.
 - 2021 Acquired 63-acre parcel, Thomas Marcuccilli "Nature Park" in Northeast Carmel
 - 2021 Began preliminary conversations with Sports Methodist Medicine regarding an Outdoor Fitness trail loop; Sports Methodist would construct with input from CCPR; CCPR would enter management agreement once complete (trail open for community use)

- Consider adding additional assets consistent with park master plans in underserved areas
- Develop age segment, facility and program experiences matrix for each park to determine who is being served and who is not
- Balance and expand program and volunteer opportunities throughout the community
 - Create continuous coordination between Recreation, ESE, and Parks divisions to better utilize existing resources and collaborate between divisions to ensure a balance of program offerings is being maintained throughout the Department
 - 2021 Nature programming gained a new format revolving around 4 core areas that help define areas of focus and responsibility for each division.

 - 2022 PNR lead several departmental All Staff meeting agendas to educate the other divisions about PNR responsibilities and park stewardship in general
 - 2022 PNR took responsibility for planning nature programs which includes working closely with R&F staff for program registrations and delivery of content
 - Identify populations/demographics in Carmel, Indiana and Clay Township by geographical area
 - Construct targeted surveys to determine needs/wants by geographical area
 - Ensure that under-utilized parks are represented in program proposal each season
 - 2021 Nature programs expanded into various CCPR park properties exploring different ecosystems
 in different areas of the Carmel/Clay community.
 - 2022 A family is registered in our Adopt A Park program to support 4.5 acre Prairie Meadow Park.
 - 2022 Invasive species management targeting Monon South Trailhead and Lenape Trace was
 prioritized to begin systematically moving north along the recreational and biological corridor of the
 Monon Greenway, specifically targeting bush honeysuckle.

Continue to evaluate need to update fitness equipment on a five-year cycle

- 2020 Cybex/Strength Circuit was replaced in first quarter of year, which concluded CCPRs previous five-year replacement cycle; 2021 will resume assessment of needs and implementation of new fiveyear plan
- 2021 New dumbbells ordered at end of 2021. No other capital improvements made to fitness due to COVID-19 impact on budgets.
- 2022 Treadmill demo occurred in January to collect member feedback and identify potential replacement options.

Identify additional revenue generating opportunities at the Monon Community Center

2021 — Continued discussions with Williams Architects on preparation of plans for a new indoor playground in Multipurpose Room-West and improvements to the adjacent Kidzone. Williams is continuing to work with playground manufacturers to explore equipment options

- 2021 Engaged in discussions exploring the potential for becoming an Indiana Medicaid Waiver provider facility. Goals for formal cost analysis and proposal to be developed in 2022.
- Develop an equipment lifecycle replacement program
 - 2021 Solicited RFPQ's to vendors specializing in Guaranteed Energy Savings Contracts to evaluate mechanical equipment at Monon Community Center/Waterpark and provide possible solutions for consideration
 - 2021 R&F Capital Replacement Plan created and proposed in Fall 2021 including outline of full Fitness Center replacement schedule.
- Use Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) to drive data-driven decisions regarding services and operations
 - Identify maintenance standards for each park maintained by CCPR
 - 2021 Recurring work orders automatically populate for weekly/monthly/quarterly preventative maintenance items; 2022 priority is updating maintenance management plans
 - Standards were reduced in 2021 to prioritize custodial roles due to lack of part-time staffing
 - 2022 Maintenance standards were updated and documented during a review and update to the Maintenance Monagement Plan
 - Continuously evaluate staff, equipment, and resources needed to achieve community expectations
 - 2020 Approved 2021 budget begins to ramp up field staff and key management position with PNR, while additional supervisory and technical staff will be requested in subsequent years to effectively manage CCPR resources
 - 2021 New FT staff hired to fulfill increasing level of service expansion throughout community including Monon corridor
 - Equipment replacement items were tabled to conserve funding due to pandemic; anticipate
 replacing UTVs in 2022 with thousands of miles reaching maximum lifecycle due to quality
 preventative maintenance but anticipating an end to that optimism utilizing equipment
 replacement plan standards; other heavy equipment is also qualified at end of life
 - Operations budget increases to meet demands of high use facilities and increasing overall sum of restroom facilities to deliver quality levels of service with new assets.
 - 2022 2 new FT custodial maintenance technicians were added to the PNR roster. The positions were set up by reducing total number of part-time positions and repurposing those dollars to attract FT applicants and create a more sustainable staff position in an area of essential responsibilities.
 - 2022 Operations budget increases to meet demands of high use facilities and increasing overall sum
 of restroom facilities to deliver quality levels of service with new assets
 - 2022 Conversion of our fleet began by initiating a lease program to reduce overall capital expenses
 of new vehicle purchases and shift expenses to operating budget.
 - 2022 Multiple staff transitions occurred for various reasons, but included internal promotions and
 external hiring to fill various greas of need within the PNR division.
 - Continuously manage to maintenance standards and track the unit of cost to achieve the standard
 - 2021 Preventative maintenance inspections gained additional recurrence with higher level reviews
 - Working out measurables to identify rough figures for total operation costs per property with new assets that were completed in 2021 and those that will be completed in 2022 as well as existing assets
 - 2022 Updates to the Maintenance Management Plan provided a revised list of standards and establishes criteria for tracking unit costs
 - Evaluate annually the amenities that need to be update in existing parks
 - 2020 CTIP assisted CCPR in expediting replacement of playgrounds, parking lots, and other infrastructure that had reached end of life.

- 2020 CCPR utilizes regular re-occurring park inspections to address operating and capital replacements as needed
- 2021 Utilization of quarterly field staff inspections in addition to annual inspections by higher level staff to determine large priorities for capital maintenance updates and improvements
 - Inspections identified need for a large re-investment at Founders Park playground to meet standards as surfacing is completing life cycle on schedule. Parking lot will likely be a large reinvestment as well. Drinking fountain is due for a replacement and fiber expansion has created opportunities for improving security on site.
 - Inspections identified Monon trailhead locations for further updates after receiving several site improvements through kiosk sign project. Next targets will include at a minimum replacing RR doors and adding site security with adequate network connectivity.
- 2022 Quarterly field staff inspections continue to document and plan regular and capital maintenance improvements.
- 2022 Annual park inspections include condition assessments for tracking amenities that need
 maintenance as well as asset life cycle expectations.

1.T.3 ENSURE THE LONG-TERM SUSTAINABILITY OF THE PARK AND RECREATION SYSTEM:

- Develop long-term funding plan and implement Lifecycle Asset Management Plan
 - Maintain and update the Asset Management Plan as new assets are incorporated to the system and items are updated
 - 2021 Asset management plan updated with new asset infrastructure included unit cost data

Based on initial discussions, all parties supported investigating the feasibility of a Special Taxing District Bond issued through the Township. CCPR is working with the Township's accountant to conduct assessment.
- Continue and expand conservation management practices throughout park system
 - O Demonstrate the cost benefit of urban conservation management with elected officials
 - 2021 September Park Board meeting presentation with PNR staff to illustrate community engagement strategy, growth, and value of hands on stewardship
- Partner with public, private, and non-profit sectors to satisfy community needs for facilities with high construction and/or operating costs
 - Continue to partner with local agencies on joint development of properties
 - Develop feasibility studies and business plans for all new recreation facilities being considered
 - 2021 PROS Consulting prepared feasibility study for former Orchard Park Elementary School site.
 Study confirmed that the site could be a viable location for expanding summer and out-of-school camps. Information passed along to Carmel Clay Schools in order to facilitate further conversation on renovations needed in order to move partnership forward
- Expand environmental education and park stewardship programming to increase appreciation for natural resources
 - O Develop program offerings and opportunities designed around the intent for the Department to gain tangible benefits as a result of the skills obtained by participants

- 2020 Continued implementation of Citizen Science and Adopt a Park programs involving water quality assessments, bird monitoring, native and invasive plant monitoring, and park stewardship projects such as planting native trees and shrubs at sites that had invasive species (honeysuckle, etc.) removed
- 2021 Adopt A Park programming grew from 4 participants to 13
- 2021 Citizen Science programming grew participation to reach a threshold that is now capping
 participation in certain categories, while also planning for expansion in 2022 with mycology
 - Additional PNR staffing is required to sustain additional growth
- 2022 Adopt A Park programming added 2 new participant groups and expanded 1 existing participant group to engage a 2nd area.
- 2022 Citizen Science programming grew participation hours in multiple categories including: 16% increase in birding; 11% increase in bluebird nest box monitoring; 81% increase in Hoosier Riverwatch; 140% increase in Pollinator Partnership.
- Develop program offerings and opportunity coordination between divisions to create a reciprocal feed of participants between skill-based instruction (fee-based) and application-based instruction (park system benefit)
 - 2020 Junior Ranger program developed in 2020 but due to Covid-19 pandemic will not be rolled out until 2021.
 - 2021 Nature programming growth in active participation through Citizen Science and volunteer stewardship has created a need for developing pre-requisite content that participants can enroll in as a fee-based initial skill based learning opportunity and then apply for stewardship enrollment with built in training to CCPR standards.
 - 2022 Hoosier Riverwatch pre-requisite was developed and used during Master Naturalist fee-based learning opportunity. Additional pre-requisites are scheduled for 2023.
 - 2022 Anticipated Jr Ranger program changed to Nature Keepers program and under PNR development for 2023 program delivery.
- Strengthen the infrastructure for informal/unstructured, yet educational, opportunities throughout the CCPR park system
 - 2020 Added tangible educational resources to field staff vehicles for impromptu opportunities to engage visitors when available
 - 2020 Interpretive signage added to Founders Park in Spring 2020 utilizing Rain on Main funds
 - 2020 Flowing Well interpretive signs are in final stages of production and will be installed in 2021 utilizing CTIP funds
 - 2020.— Utilized social platforms to assist with community education on random environmental related topics and nature specific events including native trees, plants, winter solstice, migratory birds, clean water act, world soils day, America Recycles day, etc.
 - 2021 Nature-based programming incorporated into both ESE and SCS programs, including creek stomping, fishing, nature walks, flora/fauna identification, etc.
 - 2021 Celebration of Earth Day at all ESE locations with educational and environmental awareness curriculum share with all participants
 - 2021 Staff attempted to gain additional engagement with park visitors through informal interactions in the parks and allowed for impromptu conversations and general awareness of certain stewardship principles and general management priorities such as adverse effects of stacking rocks in Cool Creek and benefits of shoreline stabilization as well as native species benefits.
 - 2022 Continued to build on prior initiatives mentioned above.
- Achieve 100% cost recovery for Recreation & Facilities Division and Extended School Enrichment Division
 - O Tracking of true costs of service needs to continue to be updated annually

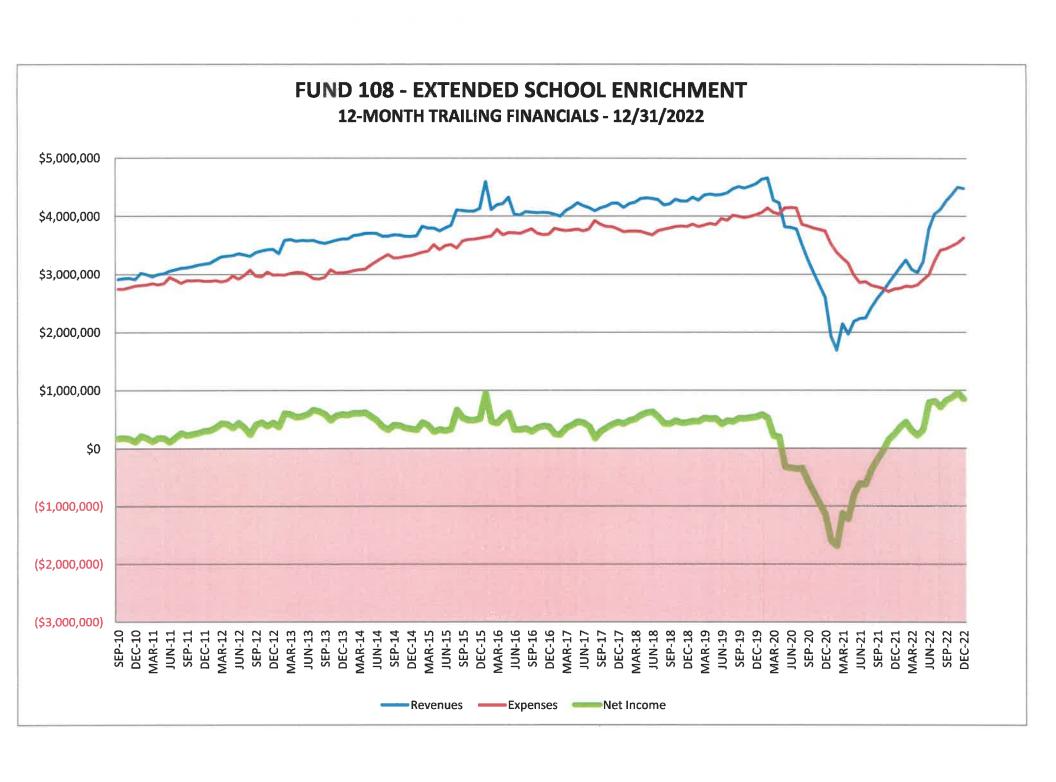

 - 2021 Submitted Next Level Trails grant application to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources
 in hopes of securing state funding for the development of the north extension of the trailhead.
 - O Track unit costs and pricing alternatives for achieving cost-recovery goals
 - O Seek to develop a corporate partner to provide funding mechanism for fee waivers offered by the department

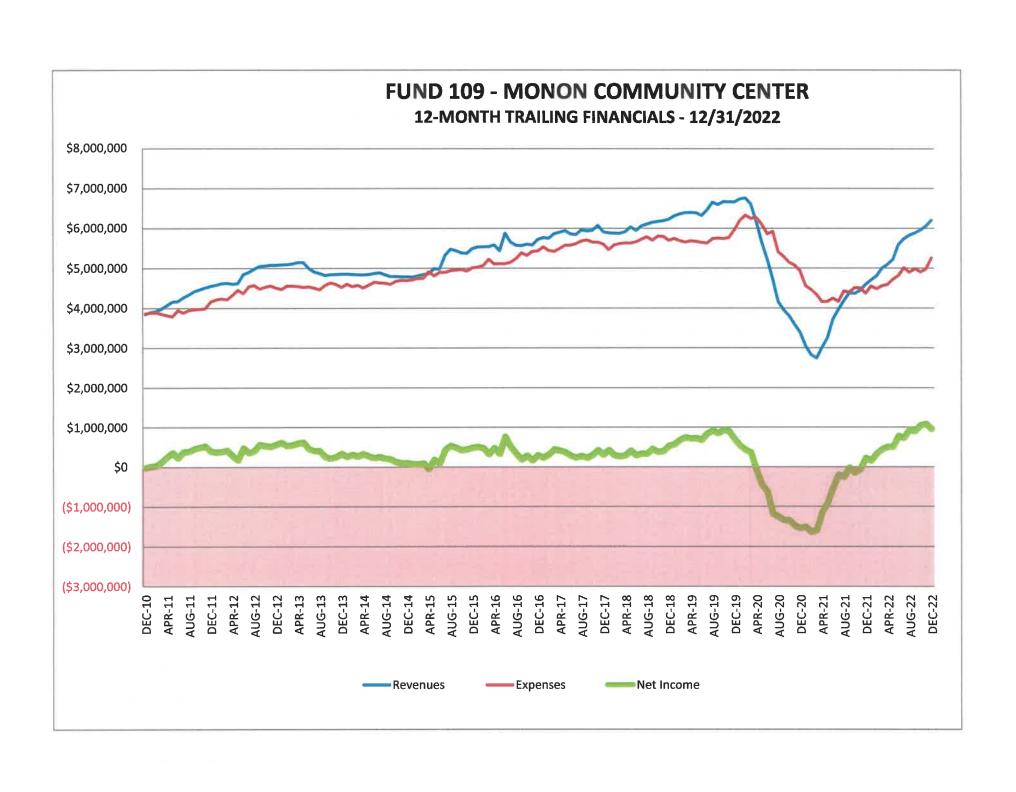
1.2 "FOURWARD" FOCUS

While CCPR should strive to achieve all recommendations outlined within this Master Plan, the following represent the top priorities for the next five years. Achievement of these will require the sustained effort and support of the community, elected officials, Park Board members, and CCPR to accomplish. Successfully implementing these objectives will ensure CCPR remains responsive to the identified needs of the community and positions itself to remain one of the best managed park and recreation systems in the country. The following outlines the key recommendations:

- Carmel White River Regional Corridor
 - O River multiuse trail and working with partners to establish a regional system
- West Regional Corridor
 - West Park development and working with partners (e.g., Dads Club, Schools, County, etc.)
 - Northwest side park
- Reimagine Existing Parks
 - Develop new master plans for Carey Grove, Cherry Tree, Flowing Well, Hazel Landing, Meadowlark, and River Heritage Parks
 - Make a significant improvement within each existing park
- Celebrate Nature
 - White River Corridor
 - West Park redevelopment
 - Flowing Well
 - Environmental education and park stewardship programming

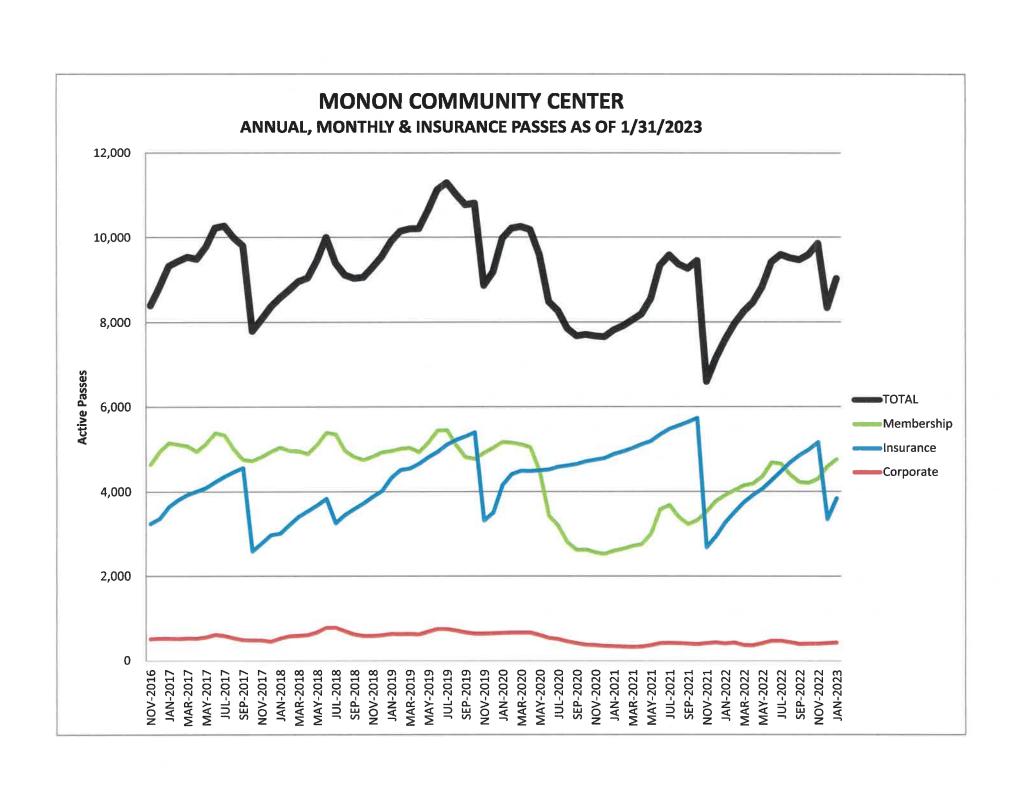

Bird Monitoring Highlights

We are approaching owl roosting and nesting season. Owls start nesting earlier in the year
than many birds to give their offspring more time in summer and fall to practice hunting
before the harsh Midwest winters set in. One of our birding volunteers, John, has captured
photos of native owls active in our parks! While many monitoring groups take a break in
the winter, our birders have been busy in January. They logged 37.25 hours and identified
45 different species.

Habitat (CQHEI)

- Habitat (CQHEI) values stands for Citizens Qualitative Habitat Evaluation Index. While it is
 a qualitative assessment given by volunteers, this evaluation is compiled with six
 variables to measure the stream habitat and general riparian health. This valuation can
 be used to compare a site over time or between two sites. Scores above 60 indicate
 generally conductive environments for warmwater fauna.
- In 2022 CQHEI values averaged 84.10 at Cool Creek (Flowing Well Park) and 74.08 at Carmel Creek (Central Park). These values are above the average for the Upper White River Watershed, 73.88. Bear Creek's average CQHEI value was 55.67, which falls below the watershed average. This value is not surprising considering the intermittent nature of the stream, only peaking after high precipitation events, and the dense invasive shrubs lining the stream bank.

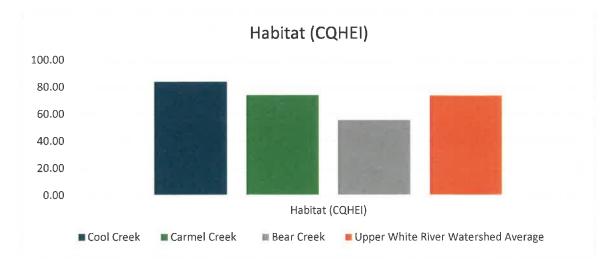


Figure 1. 2022 average Citizens Qualitative Habitat Evaluation Index (CQHEI) across creeks in Carmel Parks and Upper White River Watershed Average.

Roll Call; Call to Order & Pledge of Allegiance

Board President Taylor welcomed everyone to the meeting and asked Mr. Rude to call the role. Mr. Rude announced there was a quorum. Board President Taylor called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Board President Taylor welcomed and introduced two new Park Board members. Kristin Kouka, newly elected to the Carmel Clay School Board, was appointed to a one-year term on the Park Board. Carrie Holle, appointed by the Mayor (*Brainard*), will serve a four-year term.

Public Comments

There were no public comments.

Staff Reports

Assistant Director Baumgartner welcomed Ms. Kouka and Ms. Holle to the Park Board.

Assistant Director Baumgartner said Staff Reports were included in the Park Board packet. He asked members to review the quarterly contract log, that was included in the packet, and advise staff of any possible conflicts of interest. Board President Taylor addressed the two new Board members and stressed the importance to insure there are no conflicts of interest.

Mr. Westermeier asked about Constellation (Constellation NewEnergy-Gas Division, LLC). Assistant Director Baumgartner said he was pleased with this program, and the Department has saved money over the years. He informed the Board that Constellation is a natural gas provider, which allows the Department to receive natural gas at a reduced cost. Additional information followed.

Board President Taylor said it appears that the 108 Fund (*Extended School Enrichment*) and the 109 Fund (*Monon Community Center*) had record net income for 2022. Assistant Director Baumgartner confirmed. He said that he is very proud of the staff who did a phenomenal job of managing their budgets and deserve all the credit.

Board President Taylor spoke briefly about the mandate that requires the Monon Community Center to generate enough revenue to cover its operating expenses. Director Klitzing said it took a while for membership to grow, but it has bounced almost all the way back to pre-pandemic.

Committees

Finance Committee

In Ms. Zheng's absence, Board President Taylor advised that the Finance Committee had not met so there was no report.

Nominating Committee

Mr. Garretson apologized for being late to the meeting, but he agreed with the two other members who decided to recommend the Park Board retain the same officers as last year (2022). Mr. Kirsh made a motion to accept the proposed slate of officers, seconded by Mr. Westermeier.

Mr. Bosma advised that the names be said out loud for the record. Board President Taylor assisted Mr. Garretson with the names, which were as follows: Mr. Taylor, President; Ms. Kristunas, Vice President; Secretary, Mr. Rude, and Ms. Zheng, Treasurer.

Ms. Kristunas asked Mr. Bosma for clarification as Board President Taylor is running for an elected position (*City Council Member At-Large*). Mr. Bosma responded that he would check the necessary documents and advise later in the meeting.

Board President Taylor called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously passed 8-0.

Minutes

December 13, 2022 Park Board Meeting

Mr. Rude made a motion to approve the minutes of the Park Board Meeting dated December 13, 2022, seconded by Mr. Kirsh, and unanimously passed 8-0.

Financial Reports

Consolidated Financial Report for November 2022; CCPR P&L Statements for December 2022

Ms. Kristunas made a motion to acknowledge receipt of the Consolidated Financial Report for November 2022 and to acknowledge receipt of the P&L Statements for December 2022, seconded by Mr. Garretson.

Board President Taylor said it was awesome to see 118% cost recovery for 109 (*Monon Community Center*) and ESE (*Extended School Enrichment*) at 129%. Assistant Director Baumgartner stated that the quoted percentages were from the Consolidated Financial Statement through November, so the final numbers have not been finalized.

Mr. Kirsh and Board President Taylor commended the staff on this amazing job. He asked Director Klitzing and Assistant Director Baumgartner to relay this to Eric (*Mr. Mehl*) and the rest of the team.

Board President Taylor called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously passed 8-0.

Claims

Claim Sheet January 10, 2023; Clay Township Claim Sheet January 10, 2023; CCPR Payroll for December 2, 2022, December 16, 2022, and December 30, 2022

Ms. Kristunas made a motion to approve the Claim Sheet dated January 10, 2023; and to approve the Clay Township Claim Sheet dated January 10, 2023; and to approve Payroll Wages and Liabilities for Payroll dates December 2, 2022, December 16, 2022, and December 30, 2022, seconded by Mr. Garretson

At this time, Mr. Bosma responded to the earlier question regarding Park Board officers and members. He announced that 2.2 of the *Interlocal* details appointment of members, and 2.2.e. states, "An elected official of the City or Township shall not be eligible to serve as a member of the Joint Board."

Board President Taylor called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously passed 8-0.

Monetary Gifts, Grants, Partnerships, and Sponsorships for December 2022

Assistant Director Baumgartner reported three contributions were received in December for the Gift Fund totaling \$199.75: two donations (\$100 & \$65) were anonymous, and one (\$34.75) was a refund from ADT.

Mr. Kirsh made a motion to accept the items as presented, seconded by Ms. Kristunas, and unanimously passed 8 – 0.

New Business

Election of Park Board Officers for 2023

(Agenda item addressed earlier in meeting.)

Park Board Finance Committee Appointments

Board President Taylor stated that according to the Bylaws, the Treasurer (*Ms. Zheng*) serves as the Chair of the Finance Committee. The other two appointed members are Mr. Westermeier and Ms. Holle.

Carmel Plan Commission Appointment

Board President Taylor announced that Mr. Kirsh would continue to serve on the Plan Commission as he has gained a tremendous amount of experience over the years.

Carmel Clay Parks Foundation Liaison Appointment

Board President Taylor said that after discussions with Director Klitzing, he decided to appoint Director Klitzing as the Liaison to the Foundation as he frequently engages in communications with them. Board members may contact Director Klitzing for information related to the Parks Foundation.

Mr. Garretson said that in his very limited experience, he has found that the Foundation members have tremendous respect for Director Klitzing, but they are not convinced that the Board is informed. Director Klitzing said he would make sure the Board is informed and that the Foundation is aware of the Board's preferences.

Ratification of 2022 General Fund End of Year Budget Line Transfers

Assistant Director Baumgartner said that state law and the State Board of Accounts mandate that all general fund budget lines be at zero or finish in the positive. A summary of the line transfers was included in the Board packet. Since these transfers are within the same budget classification, the Park Board has the authority to approve. Assistant Director Baumgartner pointed out that in December (2022), the City Council approved a major item transfer of \$200,000.91; these funds were encumbered to help cover additional expenses related to the Monon Structure 12 project. He stated he was pleased to report that once again the Department finished under budget and returned approximately \$181,700.46 to the respective fiscal bodies. Since 2003 when the City became the fiscal agent for the Department, approximately \$2,623,603.95, a 20-year average of \$131,180.20, has been returned.

Board President Taylor explained the reverting fund process. For a number of years, the City has funded 100% of the 101 Fund, which is our main operating budget. Mr. Westermeier commended Director Klitzing and Assistant Director Baumgartner for their hard work. He has personal experience and knows the complexity of accomplishing this task. Mr. Kirsh added that staff has done a great job in developing a successful budgeting process.

Board President Taylor called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously passed 8 – 0.

Consideration of Professional Services Agreement with PROS Consulting, Inc. for Development of the Comprehensive Master Plan

Director Klitzing provided detailed background information related to the current Master Plan and the need to develop a new one to address transformative changes on operations in part due to the Covid-19 pandemic. He recommended that the Park Board approve a new professional services agreement with PROS Consulting for development of the new five year Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

The master plan is basically the most significant planning tool and guides the management and development of the park system. Moving forward with a new master plan puts the department one year ahead of our schedule as the current master plan covers 2020 through 2024. Director Klitzing delivered remarks about the current master plan and the need to expedite a new one at this time. Director Klitzing conveyed the costs, similarities, differences, and components of the current and proposed new master plan.

Mr. Kirsh made a motion to authorize the Director or Assistant Director, upon the review and consent of the Park Board Attorney, to executive a professional services agreement with PROS Consulting, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$269,420 for development of the comprehensive master plan.

Mr. Garretson asked for clarification. Director Klitzing said he did not want to wait two years for a new plan. The current plan has effectively been implemented and some circumstances that were the basis for the current master plan are no longer applicable. Board President Taylor added that the Department's master plan is embraced by the Department. Mr. Rude said he applicable to move forward with a new master plan. Discussion followed.

Board President Taylor called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously passed 8 – 0.

Old Business

Clay Township Impact Program Updates

Director Klitzing said that all of the Clay Township Impact Program parks are open. There are some punch list items in various parks, but nothing that precludes the public from safely enjoying the parks.

Director Klitzing added that there are ongoing discussions with the Township regarding a pedestrian bridge over White River, as well as planning for the Japanese Garden expansion south of City Hall. These projects are spearheaded through the Township. Discussion followed.

Mr. Garretson asked about the playground safety surface issues. Director Klitzing responded at length followed by discussion.

Attorney's Report

Mr. Bosma welcomed the two new Board members and provided an overview of his position relative to the Park Board and Clay Township.

Mr. Bosma is working on the project agreement for SJCA, architects and designers for the White River Trail (*Greenway*) project.

Work continues on agreements for 'The Corner' and the Carmel Redevelopment Commission, who is paying for the architect and inspector fees for design and development of the connector from Central Park to 'The Corner.' After six months, the Park Building Corp has agreed to the easement. Nick Kestner, Chair of the Park Building Corp, has relayed that he concurs with decisions made by Director Klitzing.

Work continues on the tuition benefit program for part-time employees.

Director's Report

Park Board Workshop; 6 p.m., Tuesday, January 17, 2023; Jill Perelman Pavilion

Director Klitzing reminded the Board of the upcoming Workshop on Tuesday, January 17, at West Park. The Workshop will focus on the roles and responsibilities of the Park Board, communication protocols within the Park Board, and between the Park Board and the Department, as well as discussion on the type of information Board members want to see in the Board packets. The Department has hired Austin Hochstetler of Zec Eight Insights to facilitate the Workshop. Discussion followed.

Director Klitzing said the Director's Report was included in the Board packet.

Director Klitzing said he would be attending the (*Carmel Clay*) School Board workshop on January 30th to present an overview of requests to consider using two different school properties: southwest corner of Main Street and River Road for a potential dog park; and property immediately south of the parking structure for the (*Carmel Clay*) Public Library, north of Carmel Elementary School for a potential Chinese garden.

Director Klitzing announced that last Friday (*January 6th*), he was very pleased to hear that we will be receiving a \$1,000,000 grant from Hamilton County towards wetland restorations or projects related to the White River Greenway North extension. When pursuing the READI grants, the County said they would provide \$1,000,000 each to Fishers, Carmel, and Noblesville if each were selected. The Department's White River Greenway North Extension and Fisher's White River Park were approved for the READI grants.

Mr. Garretson asked about the Department's usage of the sports building at Badger Park. Director Klitzing reflected on the successful summer camp, Move to Improve, that was hosted at the Fieldhouse.

Mr. Westermeier inquired about flushing the valves at the Monon Community Center. When he read about this project in the Director's Report, he was reminded of the problem with pinhole leaks in the copper tubing. Assistant Director Baumgartner responded that there have been no additional issues since the upgrades in the West Den a few years ago.

Mr. Westermeier asked if anymore leaks were discovered in the Lazy River at the end of The Waterpark season. Assistant Director Baumgartner said there was nothing alarming, but issues may arise in the spring when everything is turned back on.

Information Items

Board President Taylor briefly explained to the new Park Board members the intent of the Information Items as related to the School Board, Plan Commission, and Parks Foundation.

School Board

There was no report.

Plan Commission

Mr. Kirsh said he had nothing specific to report, but would be happy to address any questions.

Parks Foundation

Director Klitzing said he has been in correspondence with Dan Dutcher, Parks Foundation President. The Foundation is committed to providing a matching grant towards the Resource Development Coordinator position that has been approved for this calendar year. This new position will help with sponsorships, as well as pursuing grants for the benefit of the Carmel Clay parks system. The position will report to the Administration and Planning Director. The Foundation is very excited to help contribute towards this position which will be one of our critical elements in addressing capital funding needs of the park system for years to come.

Park Board Comments / Discussion

Mr. Kirsh stated he would answer any question regarding the upcoming construction season. He spoke about the lack of cement and how it has impacted projects as many contractors do not stockpile.

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Mr. Rude made a motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Ms. Kristunas. Board President Taylor adjourned the meeting at 7:14 p.m.

Several different styles of fitness equipment at the Monon Community Center are approaching end of functional life. In order to continue to offer the highest quality experience for its members, Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation ("CCPR") issued a Request for Quotes to replace 10 elliptical units, 2 smart spin bike units, and 2 stair climbers. The ellipticals (purchased in 2014), smart bikes (purchased in 2016), and stair climbers (one purchased in 2014, one in 2016) are no longer under warranty and have a 5-7 year life expectancy for commercial applications like the MCC. Ellipticals and stair climbers are some of the more popular pieces of cardio equipment in the fitness center.

The Precor ellipticals have continued to be a staple of our cardio equipment offerings. CCPR's intention is to stay with the same manufacturer and model as the vast majority of feedback has been positive from members on these units. Additionally, we recognize the popularity, through tracking of mileage, of our stair climbers and smart spin bikes. Our intention is to invest in upgrades with updated technology in new stair climbers and smart spin bikes.

SUMMARY:

West Park has become a fixture in the Carmel Clay community, as well as a regional destination for visitors. Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation ("CCPR") recently completed renovations to the playground, splashpad, and existing shelter (added a family restroom). The main shelter now serves as a non-reservable community space for visitors to picnic, relax while their children play, or want a reprieve from the sun.

Prior to renovations, the main shelter was a popular rental spot for family gatherings, graduation celebrations, birthday parties, and other community events generating an average of \$12,000 in annual revenue. The shelter was rented most weekends throughout the spring, summer, and fall. CCPR believes that adding additional shelters will be well-received by the public and provide CCPR with additional revenue.

The department utilized SmithGroup to develop schematic drawings for three shelters (one large and two small) including the layout (Attachment A) and the design (Attachment B). Shelters were envisioned to be similar to the Central Park East Woods shelters, which were selected from a standard catalog with additional custom features designed to blend with the aesthetic character of the park. After researching structures available from different vendors, the Clerestory Gable Shelter from RCP Shelters, Inc. was selected.

The following quote was received from RCP Shelters, Inc. for 2 small (16' x 30') shelters and 1 large (30' x 34') shelter.

• RCP Shelters, Inc.: \$117,688.50

Indiana Code Section 5-22-10-5 grants a governmental body the authority to enter into the special purchases of goods when there exists a unique opportunity to obtain supplies at a substantial savings to the governmental body. RCP Shelters, Inc. extended Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation a 10% discount for the purchase of the shelters. The quoted price includes a 10-year warranty on defects and workmanship.

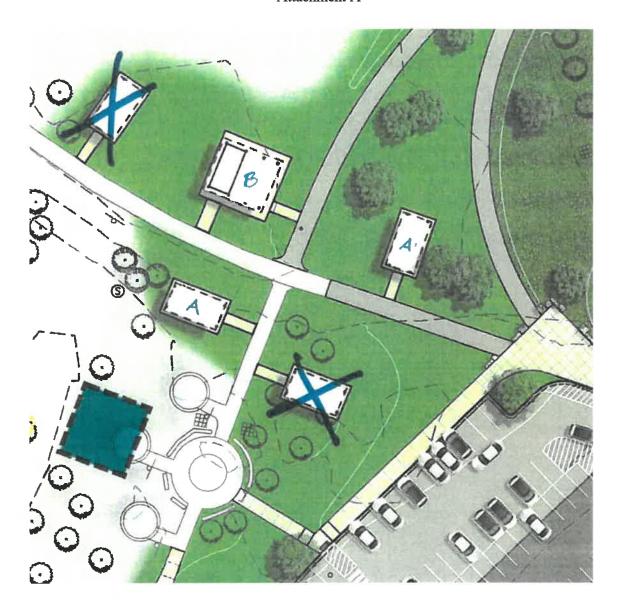
Lead times to manufacture shelters is approximately 14-16 weeks. In order to have the shelters on hand and available to construct during the 2023 season, it is important to order them at this time. Park staff are currently soliciting bids for site preparation, installation, and construction of the shelters including a storage room affixed to the larger of the three structures. It is anticipated that bids will be brought to the Park Board for approval at the March 14th meeting.

If approved, work will begin in the spring/summer of 2023 and hopefully finished by Labor Day weekend.

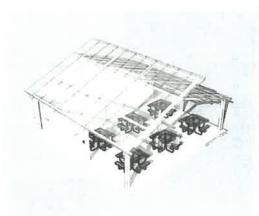

SUMMARY:

The Waterpark has become a fixture in the Carmel Clay community as well as a regional destination for out-of-town visitors during the summer months. Families plan weekend trips to visit one of the finest facilities in the state. Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation ("CCPR") installed 14 cabanas in The Waterpark in 2013. The addition of these amenities has been extremely popular and to date has generated \$488,219 in revenue. All of the cabanas are rented most days. CCPR believes that adding additional cabanas within the Kiddie Pool area (Attachment A) will be well received by the public and provide The Waterpark with additional revenue.

At the December 13, 2022 Park Board meeting, the direct purchase of cabanas was approved due to long lead times to manufacture. It was communicated to the Board that bidding for the construction of the cabanas would not occur until the end of January with consideration of bids transpiring at the February meeting.

Accordingly, CCPR solicited bids for the site work and installation and on Friday, January 31, 2023, bids were received and opened. Bids were received from the following contractors:

Powers and Sons \$414,900Ferguson Construction \$388,700

Weihe Engineers ("Weihe"), the project engineer, reviewed the bid documentation, confirmed Ferguson Construction to be the lowest responsive and responsible bidder and recommends (Attachment B) acceptance of its bid in the total amount of \$388,700.

If approved, purchase and installation can occur prior to opening The Waterpark on Memorial Day weekend 2023.

SUMMARY:

Provided for your consideration is Resolution G-2023-001 to adopt the Schematic Design Drawings for the White River 106th Street Pedestrian Bridge and Related Improvements, which are being funded through the Clay Township Impact Program (CTIP), along with other funding sources. Improvements identified within the Schematic Design Drawing include:

- A pedestrian bridge at approximately the 106th Street alignment connecting CCPR's Hazel Landing Park to the City of Fishers' Heritage Park.
- A scenic, multipurpose trail generally following along the south side of Blue Woods Creek connecting the bridge to the City's existing perimeter path along Hazel Dell Parkway.
- A new parking lot off the park entrance drive with access to the new multipurpose trail.

On July 9, 2019, the Park Board entered into an agreement with Clay Township to finance and construct improvements in six parks, including River Heritage Park. As outlined in the agreement, the Schematic Plan Drawings for each project must be approved by the Park Board, which will be used by Clay Township and their contractors to finalize construction documents and guide improvements within the parks. Once the Schematic Design Drawings are approved by the Park Board, any design changes or change orders impacting CTIP funds that vary with the schematic designs must be approved by the Director of Parks and Recreation, as the Board Designee, with a report to the Park Board.

The location of the bridge and supporting infrastructure identified within the Schematic Design Drawings aligns with both the 2020-2024 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan and 2019 White River Plan, as well as general feedback received by the Department from the public.

Based on current projections, CTIP funds will cover the majority of anticipated construction costs for the project. Clay Township is in ongoing discussions with the City of Fishers to secure additional funding for the necessary infrastructure on the east side of the river. It is possible the Park Board may also need to contribute funds if there is a shortfall, although this amount is anticipated not to exceed \$600,000. This project is eligible for use of Park Impact Fees since it is located with the White River Corridor, which is the likely recommended source for any Park Board contributions, if necessary.

The original vision was to construct a pedestrian bridge at approximately the 126th Street alignment, connecting into the existing White River Greenway within Hamilton County's River Road Park. On the east side, the bridge would connect into property owned by Conner Prairie. A trail would generally follow the Shoemaker Ditch, connecting the bridge to an existing perimeter path along Allisonville Road. This location created a number of challenges, especially as it pertains to the topography. Projected costs far exceeded available funding, making the location unfeasible, requiring the exploration of other locations for the bridge.

A location farther north and close to the proposed White River Education and Ecology Center was also considered. The bridge and connecting trails would have to be located solely on Conner Prairie property, requiring significant portions of the trail to traverse through areas that are currently or envisioned to be part of Conner Prairie's fee-based visitor experience. Based on discussions between Clay Township, Conner Prairie, and other potential partners, this site was ruled out as an option.

The proposed location for the bridge at approximately the 106th Street alignment has been discussed and studied for over a decade. Studies were completed in 2011 by Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology and 2013 by USI Consultants to explore construction of a bridge at this general location. More recently the City engaged United Consulting around 2018 to prepare plans for the bridge at the currently proposed location. Since significant work has been completed for the 2018 plans, including a design that would not require the construction of a diversion channel and/or widening of the existing river as previously anticipated by the 2013 report, the Township reengaged United Consulting to continue the design work.

As part of this project, in anticipation of increased visitation within Hazel Landing Park, we explored the feasibility of paving the existing aggregate drive and expanding the existing parking lot located near the river and canoe/kayak launch. The gravel road is predominately above a major gas pipeline, which was identified to be extremely shallow. Due to an inability to raise the road for a variety of factors, this option was deemed unfeasible. Creating a new route for the road that could be paved would have required the removal of trees within the floodway, requiring mitigation that would not only increase project costs, but detract from the proposed trail connecting the bridge to Hazel Dell Parkway's perimeter path.

Based on the above challenges, instead of expanding the existing parking lot and disrupting the open space near the river, it was determined to place a new parking lot immediately off the entrance to Hazel Landing Park. This location will accommodate 27 parking spaces and 2 handicap accessible spaces, serving as an effective trailhead for the trail.

With the City-owned Blue Woods Creek and Northern Beach properties now under management agreement, this has expanded Hazel Landing Park to 95 acres, making it our third largest park behind Central Park (161 acres) and West Park (120 acres). The City will be installing a roundabout at the 106th Street and Hazel Dell Parkway intersection in fall 2023, which will also connect into the park entrance drive. As part of this project, a new entrance sign will be constructed and modeled based on our regional park standard at the Central Park and West Park entrances.

Presuming permits are secured in a timely manner, construction of the pedestrian bridge and associated infrastructure is anticipated to begin as soon as this fall and take approximately a year to complete. Periodic disruptions, including park closures, are anticipated due to the roundabout and bridge projects, as well as Carmel Utilities' planned expansion of the 106th Street lift station that is adjacent to the gravel entry drive.

RESOLUTION G-2023-001

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE SCHEMATIC DESIGN DRAWINGS FOR THE WHITE RIVER 106TH STREET PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE AND RELATED IMPROVEMENTS

WHEREAS, the Carmel/Clay Board of Parks and Recreation (the "Park Board") is a political subdivision created and authorized to administer the Carmel/Clay Department of Parks and Recreation (the "Department") pursuant to that certain agreement entitled "Interlocal Cooperation Agreement" signed by the respective authorized officials of Clay Township, Hamilton County, Indiana (the "Township") and the City of Carmel, Indiana on July 30, 2002 and effective January 1, 2003, as amended from time to time; and

WHEREAS, the Park Board entered into an agreement with the Township through adoption of Resolution G-2019-005 authorizing the Township to finance, acquire and construct park and recreation improvements, including a new pedestrian bridge spanning the White River, which agreement has been amended from time to time with approval by the Park Board; and

WHEREAS, the Park Board is dedicated to serving the park and recreation needs of the Carmel Clay Community and recognizes the importance of sound planning to achieve this goal; and

WHEREAS, the originally envisioned location for the pedestrian bridge near 126th Street in Hamilton County was determined not to be feasible due to extensive topgraphical challenges and the projected construction costs; and

WHEREAS, a pedestrian bridge near 106th Street in Hamilton County (the "Bridge") connecting the Park Board's Hazel Landing Park with the City of Fisher's Heritage Park has been discussed by community leaders for over a decade; and

WHEREAS, the Bridge is critical for providing pedestrian and bicycle connectivity between the Town of Zionsville, the City of Carmel, and the City of Fishers along a multipurpose trail running generally parallel to 106th Street within the respective communities (the "106 Trail"); and

WHEREAS, the Bridge and the 106 Trail will further provide an east-west route within Hamilton County connecting the Monon Greenway in Carmel to the Nickel Plate Trail in Fishers; and

WHEREAS, the Schematic Design Drawings for the White River 106th Street Pedestrian Bridge and Related Improvements align with recommendations within the 2020-2024 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan, the 2019 White River Plan, and public feedback to ensure the proposed improvements are consistent with the wants and needs of the Carmel Clay Community.

Central Park

Thanks to the keen observation of Neil Whitehead (one of our Park Operations Managers) who noticed a congregation of Duke Energy employees and contractors parked in the East Woods trailhead, we learned that Duke is planning to replace their poles for a high-voltage transmission line that traverses through the east side of Central Park along the path of the former Interurban Railroad. This power line starts at Duke's substation located off 111th Street. It is largely contained within the residential property of our park neighbors south of Central Park Drive East and continues north within the park along the eastern side of the Interurban Trail before crossing 116th Street.

Duke has an easement for this transmission line dating back to 1939 and 1948, and therefore, has the right to replace the poles and clear vegetation within the easement that conflicts with access or the safety of the transmission line. The greatest impact to the park will be where the line crosses Central Park East Drive and along the Interurban Trail. While there is no scenario in which we can avoid closing the Interurban Trail while utility work is occurring, CCPR is stressing that Central Park Drive East must

remain open for park visitors. CCPR will confirm with legal counsel, but the easement appears to require Duke to repair at their cost any damages resulting from their project.

The Duke project, which is anticipated to take 6-12 months at minimum, will likely impact the timeline for the Interurban Trailhead enhancement, which is being funded and constructed by the CRC as part of the agreement for The Corner project. We were originally targeting the trailhead to be completed before fall 2023, but this will be dependent on Duke's progress.

The transmission line project may also impact the placement of the connecting trail between The Corner and the Interurban Trail, which is necessary for The Corner to meet egress requirements based on their building permits. Since this impacts a CRC project, Corporation Counsel has been assisting the CRC and the City in trying to mitigate any conflicts with the Duke transmission line and easements.

On a more positive note, CCPR had a kickoff meeting with Baumgartner Asphalt on 1/26/2023 for the trail project that will complete the Lagoon Trail Loop. This project will begin as soon as weather breaks and is anticipated to be completed in time for use this summer.

Chinese Garden

Attended School Board meeting on 1/30/2023 to present the idea of developing a Chinese Garden on Carmel Elementary School property south of the new Carmel Clay Public Library parking garage. Received consent from Carmel Clay Schools (CCS) to develop a concept plan for the proposed garden which will be presented to the School Board and Park Board at their meetings in March or April 2023. If the School Board consents to development of a Chinese Garden at this location after reviewing the concept plan, a management agreement will be prepared that will need to be approved by the respective boards.

CCPR has entered into an agreement with Purdue University to have Dr. Yiwie Huang and some of her students in landscape architecture to develop the concept plan for the proposed garden. Dr. Huang and her students will facilitate stakeholder meetings, focus groups, and a survey to solicit input to help inform their design.

Comprehensive Parks & Recreation Master Plan

The kickoff meeting for the new park system master plan will be on 2/21/2023. Staff will meet with representatives from PROS Consulting to review the scope, finalize timelines, and begin strategizing the critical public input process.

Dog Park

Also presented a proposal and preliminary concept plan to the School Board at their 1/30/2023 to seek consent to explore developing a dog park, community garden, and trails on school property located at the southwest corner of Main Street and River Road. Received notification from CCS on 2/8/2023 that we do not have support for the preliminary plan as proposed.

CCS expressed some openness to considering a plan if vehicular access and parking is off Main Street instead of River Road, as originally envisioned, and the dog park kept as far west as possible. Based on preliminary discussions with the City and Weihe Engineers, this adjustment in location may present

insurmountable challenges to secure the necessary permits. CCPR will continue investigating, but the inability to use the higher land off River Road for parking infrastructure and the dog park will likely rule this site out as a viable location for an east side dog park.

On 1/18/2023, staff visited an approximately 2-acre property adjacent to Carmel Creek near the southeast corner of 116th Street and Rangeline Road that was offered by a resident as a location for a dog park. The City Forester and a representative from the City's Engineering Department responsible for stormwater management and permitting within the floodway/floodplain also walked the site with CCPR staff. Proximity to our existing dog park, neighboring residences, and topography of the site all create impediments to developing this location as a dog park.

As an alternative to a dog park, we also evaluated the Carmel Creek site as a potential nature preserve with the potential for a future trail. The City Forester determined that the site has some good trees and its location within a riparian corridor contributes to the natural attributes. One challenge is that the eastern end of the property is bisected from the western portion by a decent size drainage swale, creating potential challenges for maintaining the eastern section, especially if any trees become hazardous and need to be removed in the future. It also adds to the cost of constructing a trail by adding the need for at least one bridge to create an effective loop trail most preferred by park visitors.

The Park Board has historically only accepted or acquired parkland that is at least 5 acres in size, unless it is contiguous with an existing park or greenway. While the property is close to Central Park, the lack of connectivity to the park or the ability to create a greenway system, along with the previously identified factors, makes this site of limited value for inclusion in the park system.

Orientations/Park Tours

Met with new Park Board members Carrie Hollie and Kristin Kouka on 2/2/2023 to provide a general orientation of CCPR funding and operations, as well as a tour of the park system. Also provided a tour of the park system to new City Councilor Teresa Ayers on 1/26/2023.

If any existing Park Board member would like to have a similar tour of the parks, please contact Sandi Young to arrange a date. Please allow 4 hours for the tour. A lot has changed over the past couple of years, so this is a great way to check out the reimagined parks and see firsthand the locations of the future improvements we have in store.

Staff Reports

Based on the feedback received from the Park Board at the 1/17/2023 workshop, I am working with the senior management team to identify how best to streamline staff reports and incorporate key metrics that are helpful for the Park Board. Once staff has prepared recommendations and sample reports, I will convene a committee comprised of senior management and several Park Board members to review. This meeting will likely occur in Q2.

Thomas Marcuccilli Nature Park

CCPR finally received a solid draft of the Thomas Marcuccilli Nature Park (TMNP) Master Plan from MKSK on 1/12/2023. After reviewing the draft, CCPR provided some edits and has been working closely with MKSK to wrap up the report. It is now anticipated the final draft will be complete in time to present to the Park Board at its March meeting.

West Park

Bids will be opened on 2/17/2023 for construction of three picnic shelters and installation of the 116th Street perimeter path from the entry drive to Jill Perelman Pavilion to near the park's western boundary. Presuming all goes well, we anticipate bringing a recommendation to the Park Board at the March meeting. Construction on both projects is anticipated to begin in the spring with the goal of having everything completed for use in summer 2023.
